Think twice before choosing caesarean

Opting for a caesarean section in your first pregnancy can increase your risk of complications in future natural deliveries. Scientists from the NSW Health Department and the University of Sydney studied more than 136,000 women and found that those women delivering naturally with their second pregnancy after a caesarian were at increased risk of uterine rupture, hysterectomy, haemorrhage, admission to the intensive care unit and infection. Their second babies were also more likely to be delivered prematurely and require admission to intensive care. Although complications are not common, the increased risk is the result of a scar on the uterus which, in the worst cases, could rupture during vaginal birth.
